

The theme for the Community Oncology Alliance (COA) 2019 Community Oncology Conference is "Ensuring Quality, Affordable & Accessible Cancer Care." These are critically important areas for patients with cancer and a key differentiator for community oncology practices. The Conference will focus on empowering practices and professionals to thrive in the community oncology system of the future.

COA has been on the frontlines of cancer care over the last year, listening and learning on behalf of all practices, oncology professionals, and patients. Through our advocacy in DC, hugely successful learning networks, and peer networks we have taken the latest knowledge and built a powerful 2019 Conference.

The 2019 Community Oncology Conference will take place **April 4-5, 2019** at the renovated **Walt Disney World Dolphin Hotel in Orlando, Florida**. Programming will run from the morning of Thursday, April 4 through the early afternoon on Friday, April 5. Ample time has been set aside for attendees to visit the exhibit hall, interact with peers, and stretch their legs.

Following record setting years of growth, 2019 promises to be the biggest *Community Oncology Conference* ever, complete with more than 330,000 square feet of meeting space; a 55,000 square foot exhibit hall; private breakout conference rooms; and more. There will also be sidebar workshops and opportunities for learning with a deeper dive into select subject matter.

Over two packed days of learning and networking, oncology professionals, advocates, allied stakeholders, and the community at-large will gain valuable insights into how best to achieve quality and value in cancer care while keeping their primary focus on the patient.

Keynote Speakers: Inspiring Survivors Shelley Smith, ESPN Reporter, and Jake Olson, USC Long Snapper

Our keynote speakers are the inspiring duo of Shelley Smith and Jake Olson. Both cancer survivors, they will share an inspiring story of friendship and survival.





**Shelley Smith** is a five-time Emmy-winning reporter for ESPN since joining the network in January 1997. Most recently, she and her production team won for best long-form story for a piece she wrote and reported on Jake Olson, who is blind and the long snapper on the USC football team.

**Jake Olson** faced a choice many adults can't even make and yet he did it at the tender age of 12. At 10 months of age, malignant tumors were found in both eyes, diagnosed as



retinoblastoma. At that time, he lost his left eye. At age 12, he had his right eye removed.

Shelley met Jake at Notre Dame stadium one week before his surgery for a personal interview. ESPN then followed Jake as he played golf, cheered his classmates in pep rallies, and then as a starting long snapper for his favorite team, the USC Trojans.

Six years later, Shelley reached out to Jake to let him know that she too had been diagnosed with cancer. Their friendship blossomed, and Jake is now providing inspiration to Shelley.



### **Unique Four Track Conference Format**

The 2019 Community Oncology Conference continues to offer something for every oncology professional with our four distinct tracks covering clinical, business, pharmacy, and advocacy topics:

 The clinical track will be presented in multiple learning formats, including panel discussions, interactive sessions, and lectures. Session highlights include new age cellular therapies; artificial intelligence and predictive analysis; new lung protocols; using I-O in the community setting and treatment decision-making utilizing genetics.

- 2. The **business track** is geared to both clinical and non-clinical attendees and will cover a variety of topics, including updates on the CMMI Oncology Care Model; the progress on COA's OCM 2.0; Payer Exchange Summit updates, including a new self-insured employer pilot; and a legislative update from Capitol Hill.
- 3. A pharmacy track will feature session topics including next generation sequencing around orals; complementary and alternative medicines; Integrative Medicine and innovative digital technologies for management of patients on oral therapies.
- 4. For the ninth consecutive year, the COA Patient Advocacy Network (CPAN) will host a patient advocacy track focused on educating advocates on the power of their voice, with tailored workshops on topics in cancer care and policy. A look at patient involvement in clinical trials will also be discussed.
